Sandra was a first-year kindergarten teacher and was about to get a lifelong teaching lesson her very first week. Little Liesl was having a wonderful time at kindergarten, and when her dad came to pick her up at the end of the day, she began skipping down the hallway to meet him. Halfway to her father, she spun around and ran to her teacher with her arms out. Mrs. Rice went down on her knees to get ready for the hug, and to her surprise, Liesl kissed her right on the lips! DISCUSSION QUESTIONS:

- If not, why do you think that is? Do you think you could make a difference?
- Could your school or church (or both!) be the place where people with disabilities not only attend, but belong?
- How do you support families who have someone with a disability living in their home?
